Choosing A Sponsor

Choosing a sponsor in Alcoholics Anonymous is probably the most daunting task every newcomer faces. Here you are, thrust into a completely foreign environment, surrounded by total strangers who laugh a lot, hug even more, and tell you to "keep coming back," not necessarily in that order, and you're supposed to pick a sponsor. What's a newcomer to do?

First of all don't panic. Lots of alcoholics have done this before you. Just go to lots of meetings ... and things seem to take care of themselves. Attendance at meetings will help you meet new people who will love you for who and what you are, a fellow alcoholic reaching out for help with a deadly disease. By attending meetings and sharing, other members will get to know you and how you got to the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous, whether it was by personal choice, at the insistence of an employer or a family member.

Observe who "has what you want" whether it is a smiling face and serene manner in meetings, a successful career, a beautiful family, or a shiny red Porsche parked outside. Learn how these people handled difficult circumstances, faced fears, survived tragedy or overcame seemingly insurmountable obstacles without drinking.

When you find someone who has what you want, go up and introduce yourself. Maybe ask them out to coffee and get to know them better. If you're invited out with a group by all means go. The sooner you get involved in Alcoholics Anonymous and with the people in your meetings, the sooner you will feel "a part of," instead of "different from" everyone else, a feeling we fondly call "terminally unique."

Finally, ask; it's simple as that. Just say, "Hi, my name is Nancy. Will you be my sponsor?" It doesn't have to be any harder than that.

Don't take it personally if the first person you ask cannot sponsor you. A.A. members take sponsorship very seriously, and realize that taking on a new sponsee is a big commitment of their time and their emotional energy. They will be, in essence, the guardian of your sobriety and will help guide you through the Twelve Steps and teach you how to practice the principles of Alcoholics Anonymous in all your affairs. So, the axiom applies: If at first you don't succeed, try, try, again. Sooner or later you will find the person God meant to sponsor you.

Willingness is one of the first things sponsors look for in a sponsee. They will probably ask how serious you are; because, depending on your answer the next "suggestion" might be for you to attend 30 meetings in 30 days. Or 90 in 90. It all depends upon the sponsor. After all, you always managed to get your alcohol, didn't you?

Sponsors tend to sponsor as they were sponsored. That means if they were loved until they could love themselves, they will, most likely, just ooze all over you. On the other hand if they were sponsored by a Big Book thumper or a Step Nazi, you may be memorizing the Steps, prayers, paragraphs and A.A. slogans to apply to your life.

Your first sponsor may be your only sponsor, or just the first of several teachers who will enrich your life as you and they grow and change in the program. Sometimes other A.A. members may suggest someone who might be a good match for you, other times an A.A. member may suggest to you that they would like to sponsor you. There have even been instances where people sponsor each other like Bill and Bob in the early days. The beauty of A.A. is that there are no rules.

Perhaps the most interesting thing about sponsorship is that almost every sponsor shares that they get far more out of sponsorship than they give. Want to know why? Keep coming back.

No society can function well without able leadership at all its levels, and A.A. can be no exception. But we A.A.'s sometimes cherish the thought that we can do without much personal leadership at all. We are apt to warp the traditional idea of "principles before personalities" around to such a point that there would be no "personality" in leadership whatever. This would imply rather faceless robots trying to please everybody.

A leader in A.A. service is a man (or woman) who can personally put principles, plans, and policies into such dedicated and effective action that the rest of us naturally want to back him up and help him with his job. When a leader powerdrives us badly, we rebel; but when he too meekly becomes an order-taker and he exercises no judgment of his own—well, he really isn't a leader at all.
